The Geneva Bible was the first English Bible translated by a committee.

There are at least 103 major translations of the entire Bible into English, plus at least 115 lesser known, single testament, partial, or archaic (pre 16th century A.D.), translations into English (or older forms of English).

Most Bible translations have undergone multiple revisions or updates including for spelling, grammar, and content. This chart does not reflect all updates.
